


#### The Planning Process

# From the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)'s Comprehensive Preparedness Guide



Figure 6: Steps in the Planning Process



How connected are you [your Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC)/School Based Health Center (SBHC)] to your community/regional emergency preparedness/ planning efforts?

- Do you know which state entity is responsible for emergency management?
- Do you know how emergency management is organized in your state (regional offices/local offices)?
- Does your state have an emergency management program specific to healthcare?
- Do you know how to access your state's medical reserve corp?

Don't try to plan this alone – your Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC)/School Based Health Center (SBHC) are part of a community.

But don't let the other planners leave you out or make assumptions!



- Understand risk
- Use the results of risk analysis

If an emergency impacting the schools occurs, how will services at your School Based Health Center (SBHC) be impacted?

- What gaps in service will exist and who would be impacted? Students, family members, teachers/staff, volunteers, community members?
- At what point will those gaps begin to pose an unacceptable risk? A one-day snow day vs. threeweek quarantine vs. multi-month pandemic?



- Determine operational priorities
- Set goals and objectives

What are your operational priorities and how can telehealth be used to facilitate those? How would you define success?

- Type of care?
  - Is it crisis management?
  - Is it not having any disruptions in care?
  - Is it access to care for all?
- Target population?
  - For existing patients? Their immediate/extended family members?
  - For all school students, faculty and staff?
  - For anyone in the community?

Telehealth Solutions can mean many things:

Phone or basic video calls for: behavioral healthcare, symptom re-checks, medication refills.

Enhanced video calls with exam (performed by the patient, lay person or nurse)

New complaints,

Injuries,

Diagnosis & treatment of contagious illnesses without exposure

Each desired scenario has different technology needs for equipment and connectivity.

Telehealth may be a viable solution to fill certain gaps:

Providers working remotely (home or alternate location) with care delivered to:


- Shelter School-based Health Center Access Points
- Home via school-owned device, via personal device
- School building, but not the School-based Health Center (SBHC)

Providers working in their usual place, but patients are in alternate places.



#### Do you have an up-to-date written plan?

 Does your plan have a section on how you will communicate or access information if broadband or cellular service is interrupted?



Be prepared


CISA provides Priority Telecommunications Services at no cost to qualified school administrators, teachers, and staff.

- Does your plan also include how you will address your own facility being impacted and providers needing to work from alternate locations (like home)?
- Do you have defined roles and responsibilities for staff and providers?



If not, who will be in charge of developing the plan and what needs to be included?

- What types of school emergencies are highprobability ones around which you should have detailed planning?
- How will you access student/patient records if the school building is closed or not accessible or if/when internet access is interrupted?
- What equipment (hardware and software) is needed and how will these be kept up to date and tested?
- Should software be pre-installed on student laptops? Who will do this and how will this be tested and kept up to date?



## If not, who will be in charge of developing the plan and what needs to be included (continued)?

- How will students who don't have internet access your services?
- Will your school IT security policies allow students or family members access to the school wifi network from outside the building in the event of an emergency?
- What privacy and data security considerations are needed?
- What types of technical support might be needed?
- What types of specialty care might be needed for different types of emergencies? Do you have provider networks and contacts set up for this?



How will you make sure people know about the plan and that it will actually work when there is an emergency?

- Is your emergency plan part of your onboarding documents and training for new staff?
- Is your emergency plan part of annual staff training/retraining?
- Do you have regular (monthly, quarterly or biannual) exercises to test your plan?
- Is there a process for getting input and updating your plan after each regular exercise?
- Is there a need to communicate this to others in the school/community?



Remember, when disaster strikes the time to prepare has passed.


