



- Communication
 - Outreach

- Operational
- Partnerships

Communication Strategies

Paperwork

- Do your homework have lists of children who need immunizations compiled during summer months
- Make it easy- give all options for registration (online, paper, text)
- Add information and paperwork to school websites
- OAsk medical home/primary care provider on the school registration paperwork and work with school to offer immunizations

Communication Strategies

- Events/Technology
 - Open Houses, Parent Teacher Organization Meetings, Sports Eventsany opportunity to get in front of children and parents
 - School Alerts/Notification Systems
 - Social Media/Electronic Health Record "blasts"
 - Community Events during Summer; Back-to-School events
 - Mobile Events

Communication Strategies

- School Notification Messaging (example):
 - Create a unique message for the administrator to use keep it simple!
 - Ask school to send message separately from regular school news
 - Send message via all platforms text and voicemail
 - Add your staff to the school notification messaging system so you can hear the message

Outreach Strategies

Events

- Events with Schools or other community partners in the summer (Be Creative!)
- OUtilize "Champions" i.e. parents or faculty at schools who have used health center services
- **OVideos on your Health Center website about "what to expect" during the immunization appointment**
- **OSCHOOL Alert/Notification System Messaging**
- **OBack-to-School events/Backpack handout events**
- OHost a "Drive-in movie night" in the community
- OMobile unit to "hard to reach" areas/communities

Outreach Strategies

- Drive-in Movie Night
 - Concept is to have an opportunity for students, parents/guardians, and Health Center staff to connect during "off" school times
 - Students and families get pizza and the chance to watch a movie
 - Creates access for needed Well Child Checks, immunizations, sports
 physicals, and other visits create evening schedule & book appointments in
 advance
 - Behavioral Health counselor onsite to "meet and greet"
 - Have Health Center/School Based Health Center patient enrollment paperwork ready to hand out, even if services aren't used



- Prep charts (and parents/guardians) before visits
- Turn Sports Physicals into Well Child Checks
- State/private vaccines available for all insurances and uninsured
- If School Based Health Center program:
 - Connect unattached/uninsured patients to your Health Center during the summer to schedule immunizations
 - Open clinics 1 week before school to provide immunizations
- Utilize Mobile Units to provide events in more rural or hard-to-reach places

- Mobile Units
- As of July 2023, the National Association of Community Health Center's data showed that School-Based Health Care is the #2 site for health center mobile units (behind community events) and preventive visits and immunizations are the #1 and #2 services offered
- Can increase access in locations other than the school building, particularly in rural areas
- Can also house additional equipment (dental/vision)
- Also helpful for branding/marketing

 Mobile Units-The Importance of Workflows



- Evening Hours- open during sporting events or other times
- Work with school nurse to schedule those that need immunizations
- Standing orders/default option during all visits
- Financial Incentives
- How comfortable are your providers in explaining needed immunizations? (motivational interviewing training)
- Vaccine ambassadors

- Telehealth
- History, parental concerns, even consent can be done on telehealth video or phone call prior to the having the exam and immunizations done in person.
- Can provide the exam and immunizations at the Health Center, mobile unit, or school (if a School Based Health Center program).

Partnership Strategies

- Schools- Providing space and resources for school-based health center sites and services, training for school teams, building protocols together, supporting the whole school/community/child
- School Nurses employed by school, Local Education Agency (LEA), or health department
- Health Center Collaborative agencies Behavioral Health, other health centers/regional relationships

Partnership Strategies

- Associations- The School Based Health Alliance, National Association of Community Health Centers, state Primary Care Associations- share resources and knowledge with each other
- Funders- local, regional, state, and national
- *Featured Partner*- Full-Service Community Schools Partnerships

Partnership Strategies

Community Schools

- Four Pillars of <u>Community Schools</u>
 - Integrated Student Supports
 - Expanded and Enriched Learning Time and Opportunities
 - Active Family and Community Engagement
 - Collaborative Leadership and Practices
- Full-Service Community Schools
 - Coordination of academic, social, and health services through partnerships.
