
Purpose of CDC DASH Youth Empowerment Project

What is a Youth Advisory Council?

A **youth advisory council** is a body of diverse youth who vocalize the health needs of adolescents <u>and</u> who are engaged in planning and implementing projects to address structural barriers to adolescent health in their schools and communities.



How Do Youth Advisory Councils Balance Youth Leadership With Support?

Balancing adult support with youth leadership can be hard. It takes **practice.** It takes **relationship building.** Adults should listen to and respect young people's role in making decisions. Adults also must understand that youth need ongoing support.



Focus for Youth Advisory Councils

. . .



YACs might focus, for example, on preventing drug abuse, improving mental health, or decreasing sexual health risks.



YACs could focus on creating safe spaces for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or questioning (LGBTQ+) youth, students with disabilities, and other youth within a specific school district.




YACs focused on decreasing the sexual health risks of students could inform education programs and counseling, testing, or treatment services for students.

Transgender Student Rights

Pronoun and Name Changes

You can change your name and pronouns in your email, in ASPEN, and on attendance sheets. The changes will also appear on the parent portal.

Steps on how to do this

- Go to a social worker
- · Go to a counselor
- Go to a trusted teacher
- Go to your GSA/LGBTQ+ club (if one exists) and talk to the adult watching over

Restroom and Locker Room Spaces

All students can use any restroom and locker room that corresponds with their gender identity. NO student can be forced to use a restroom or locker room because of their identity.

Dress Code

Every student has the right to dress in a manner consistent with their gender identity or gender expression within the constraints of the dress codes adopted for all students at their schools.

Gender-Neutral Facilities Steps on how to help or advocate

- · If you don't have a gender-neutral facility:
 - Talk to a student rep, student voice club, or a GSA/LGBTO+ club
 - Talk to a supportive adult at school
- If you have gender-neutral facilities:
 - Let students know they have this option
 - Let the locations be known
 - Make a map and post it at school



Uniondale Union Free School District, New York

- Site Context One high school with approximately 2,000 students
- YAC Membership 15 students:
 freshmen through juniors
- Final Project School-wide Social
 Emotional Learning (SEL) day

Data Collection Methods

- Key informant interviews with district liaisons
- Focus groups with youth YAC members
- Content analysis of meeting notes/transcripts





Lessons Learned for Site Implementation

Orientation & Context

- Consortia need to secure buy-in from multiple districts
- Adults and students alike are learning how the district/consortia works

YAC Planning

- Staffing is critical
- Bureaucracy affects planning
- Planning takes time
- Determining how much to compensate youth can be challenging





Lessons Learned for Site Implementation



Youth Recruitment, Selection, & Onboarding

- Use different methods to reach a broad, diverse group of youth
- Support students with the onboarding process
- Team building is critical for YAC members
- Share the district's decision-making processes



Lessons Learned for Site Implementation

Project Planning & Implementation

- Adults and students are learning how to share power
- Adults and youth alike need skills to use data
- Frequent meetings may be needed
- Disempowered adults cannot empower young people

Sustainability Planning

- Sustainability needs to be planned from the beginning
- YAC =/= a program



Lessons Learned for Technical Assistance (TA)

- Understanding site context is essential for all aspects of YAC planning and implementation
- Sites can have strengths with programming and weaknesses with partnerships

- Internal dynamics affect communication and implementation of TA
- TA sessions can be used to help sites get on the balcony, share information, reflect, and strategize





Lessons Learned for Technical Assistance (TA)

- Timing of site visit depends on the readiness of the site
- Sites need a continuous stream of funding to support sustainability
