Y-AP Settings and Activities



Avoid Tokenism



• Give youth the right to define their own engagement Involve youth in planning, implementing, and evaluating of work •Trust youth to rise to the occasion rather than underestimating their potential • Listen more than you speak

Why WE Promote Y-AP?

•Y-AP is an issue of social justice. This is expressed in the saying, "Nothing about us, without us."

•Y-AP strengthens democratic society. By actively participating in group decisionmaking, young people develop the skills, knowledge, and dispositions they need to be active and engaged community members

•Y-AP is developmentally responsive practice. Youth thrive in settings that support their ability to make a difference

Barriers Youth Face

Perceived Lack of Credibility

leading to their contributions being undervalued or overlooked.



Time Constraints

leading to time management issues.

Limited Knowledge

Hindering their ability to contribute meaningfully.



Decision-Making Power

They may feel they have less influence in decision-making processes





Barriers Youth Face PART 2

Meeting Locations

Leading to lack of participation or not being able to participate altogether



Compensation

leading to pursuing paid opportunities over a Board.

Meeting Times

Leading to being excluded from meetings





Not Being Taken Seriously

Feeling like you are "just a kid"

Why is it important to include with youth?

Diverse Perspective

Brings a new and fresh perspective; Life through a different lense

Create Future Leaders

Provides valuable skills and experience to the next generation

Improved Communications

Help to bridge the generational gaps and understanding

Organizational Credibility

Shows the organization values and respects all age groups



Why is it important to include youth? PART 2

Engagement

ensures that decisions are relevant to young people

Inclusion

ensures their voices and needs are represented

Advocacy

Help raise awareness and support for the organization

Board of Directors Responsibilities

Committees

Finance, Fundraising, Development, and Policy

Budgeting

Ensures financial health of the organization

Fundraising

Leverages personal networks to solicit donations

Advocacy

Acts as ambassador to the organization

Events

Assists with planning and organizing events

Strategic Planning

Works with ED to create long term goals/plans

★ Welcome all forms of participation -not just financial

★ Don't stop at recruitment
