




















- Review in advance with Health Center Leadership/County Leadership

# Coordinating Deployment




#### Communication

- Health Centers and Schools have inherent cultural differences
- Assign 1 individual to be point of contact on both sides
- Clearly identify timeline and expectations prior to start of year
- Regular check-ins
- Allow time/buffer for authorization/planning



## Coordinating Deployment



 Clear Vision – Providing Care on mobile deployments

#### **Patient Evaluation**

- Tends to lean 'routine vision'
- Communicating to patient without the parent
- Undiagnosed Headaches and Eye Strain
- Reading comfort
- Managing Double Vision







### Coordinating Deployment

Clear Vision – Providing Care on mobile deployments

#### **Optical**

- Simplify your offerings build a 'deployment pack'
- Plan to return in 2-3 week to dispense all glasses at once
- Ensure central points of contact remain in communication
- Preparation in advance regarding eligibility/flow are keys to success

### Information about AAPHC

- Corporation initially established in 1978 and current institution was incorporated in 1979.
- Grant for FQHC funding to develop clinic in Lee County was based on thesis project regarding lack of care for women and babies in the community, particularly prenatal care. AAPHC did not implement OB services until 2009...thirty years later.
- AAPHC had three locations in 1982 and has grown to include 30, which includes 11 school-based sites.
- AAPHC opened the doors to it's inaugural School-Based Health Center in March 2013.





# **AAPHC Optometry Department**

- Currently have 1 Optometrist along with 1 Ophthalmologist on staff; currently recruiting for an additional Optometrist
- Staffing for SBHC includes Optometrist, Optician, and 2 Optometric Technicians
- Served 3,681 patients according to the 2023 UDS
- Has served 4,506 SBHC patient encounters since the opening of the SBHC vision clinic in 2018.
- Also serves patients at 2 of our outpatient community clinics;
   over 21,000 encounters to date for this program
- Currently have 3 optometry sites along with optometry on our mobile unit







- Received funding from the One Sight Foundation in 2017 to start a vision center in our School Based Health Center program.
  - Funding included construction of the site, salaries for 1 year (Optometrist, Optician, Optometric Technician, and a Front Desk Receptionist)
  - Free frames for patients that met poverty guidelines and did not have vision benefits for frames
  - Allowed AAPHC to also open a community clinic for optometry
- Also received funding from the Association of Underserved Clinicians to start another vision center at one of our SBHC clinics
  - Funding included the equipment for a vision center at Dooly County Elementary and Middle School (a very rural community with lack of specialty services)



# **Space/Clinic Layout**

- Used a classroom located within an elementary school for the vision center.
  - Two exam rooms (Lanes)
  - Pre-Test Room
  - Front Desk Receptionist area
  - Workstation area for the Optometrist and Optometric Technicians
  - Workspace for the Optician
  - Space for the Frames area
  - Small waiting area for the students/patients








### **Services Offered**

- Vision Exams for Students, Siblings of students, Faculty & Staff, and families of the faculty and staff
- Frames
- Ophthalmology Services
- Transportation Services via the School System



# **SBHC Optometry Clinic Process**

- Consent Forms are sent home to the parents to complete every year during the first week of school
- Patient Navigator works the consent forms to schedule appointments for the SBHC vision clinics
- AAPHC Pediatricians, Family Medicine providers, and SBHC providers refer patients to the SBHC vision clinic
- Referrals from AAPHC providers are worked by the optometric technicians and the referral specialist dedicated to the SBHC program
- Transportation is provided for the students to access the services in all of the school systems that we serve for optometry services



## **Operations/Sustainability**

- We bill the student's insurance for the vision services provided which includes frames
- If the student does not have any insurance and the parent cannot pay for the vision exam and/or frames, we do not turn any student away
- We make sure to schedule the patient back for their annual exameach year
- We have access to the school system's infinite campus system to be able to locate students if they move to another school. This system also gives us access to the student's phone number as well to be able to reach the parents
- We set-up one or two schools daily to be transported to the SBHC vision center for services



# **Patient Stories/Case Studies**

- Elementary School Student Success Stories
- 1st Month Open- Over 200 students seen with 160 of the students needing glasses
- Have seen over 3,500 patient encounters since the opening of the center at the school in 2018 and over 21,000 patient encounters within the community clinic since the clinic opening in November 2017
- Expanded to our mobile unit with vision services to another school system and have participated in a service project with the Department of Education. AAPHC will continue expansion of this and other opportunities in the future


# School Based Mobile Vision Services

### School Required Vision Screening



- Vision screenings are required for students in the following grades:
  - Preschool (prior to entering kindergarten)
  - Kindergarten
  - 1st grade
  - 3rd grade
  - 5th grade
  - 7th grade
  - 9th or 11th grade (as determined by the school district)
- In Ohio, 80% of children who fail school vision screening do not receive a comprehensive eye exam.






Eye Exam

Glasses as necessary

Sign up by filling out a consent form and turning it in to your school. No insurance? No problem! Treatments are available for those who are insured or uninsured. No out-of-pocket cost. Insurance is billed, if you have it.


#### **Consent for Treatment:**

- Physical consents sent home with students at the beginning of the academic year.
- Electronic consents can be sent via email or text.

### **Outreach Process**



- Services are coordinated with the school nurse or school designee.
- Students are registered prior to the outreach teams visit to the school.
- School nurses provide priority list based upon the following factors:
  - Failed vision screening
  - Individual Education Plan requirements
  - School staff or parent concerns
- After completion of the priority list, the team begins exams on younger grades and moves up based upon time availability.
- Consents coordinated according to classrooms to reduce classroom disruptions.



### **Outreach Vehicle**









Students identified in need of glasses do frame selection same day.

Licensed Optician assists students with frame selection.

Some schools have space to allow for pretesting and frame selection to occur within the school building.

#### Document is a triplicate:

- Home document
- School document
- Health Partners document





Glasses received and placed according to classroom for dispensing.

Glasses are dispensed within two weeks of exam day.

Optician returns to the school to dispense glasses.

Outreach team conducts referrals and follow-ups as necessary.

Students also receive replacement glasses for broken or lost glasses.

### Service Costs



- Services are billed to insurance.
- There is no out of pocket cost for the Vision Outreach Program.
- Health Partners is commitment to the provision of vision services regardless of ability to pay for services.
- Health Partners sustains the Vision Outreach Program through billing for services and organizational revenue.
- Health Partners has received operational grant funding through the Ohio Department of Health to help support initial implementation of the Vision Outreach Program.

### 2022-2023 Academic Year




- Ohio is facing a shortage of optometrists, particularly in rural and underserved areas.
- Vision Outreach Program
  - 1 Outreach Team
  - 1.0 FTE Optometrist
  - 1.5 Opticians
- School Visited: 32 schools
- Comprehensive Exams: 2,097 unduplicated students
- Glasses Dispensed: 1,354 pair of glasses

### 2023-2024 Academic Year



- Vision Outreach Program
  - 3 Outreach Teams
  - 2.75 FTE Optometrist
  - 4 Opticians
- School Visited: 102 schools
- Comprehensive Exams: 6,110 unduplicated students
- Glasses Dispensed: 2,816 pair of glasses



### 2024-2025 Academic Year



- Vision Outreach Program
  - 6 Outreach Teams
  - 4.0 FTE Optometrist
  - 5.0 FTE Opticians
  - 2.0 FTE Receptionists
  - 1.0 FTE Coordinator
- Receptionists register all patients and answer calls regarding program/services.
- Program Coordinator works with all school nurses and teams to schedule visits to schools.
